LOSS OF LIVELIHOODS, CONTAMINATION, SEXUAL ABUSE

We published a scorecard to document the lack of remedy for harm in Liberia and OPIC's failure to implement investigation recommendations. • We fed lessons learned into comments on OPIC's review of its social and environmental policies, advocating that future projects better protect communities.

GLOBAL NETWORK, TRAININGS AND DATA

We are fostering a global movement for accountability through our trainings and resource guides for communities and their advocates, facilitation of an International Advocates Working Group, and research and reporting on accountability in development finance.
